The meeting was opened by reading the minutes of the prior meeting and their approval.



Taylor had been contacted by Louise Shadduck, Secretary of the Department of Commerce and Development, for the details of this much-publicized, initial complaint under the aforementioned Law. She stated she had received numerous phone calls and was receiving considerable mail. A full report to the Governor was deemed immediately essential. The formulation of the report was immediately made and typed, a copy being sent to Louise Shadduck.


The regular business of new applications and etc. was taken care of.

Tour Guide Fined \$300 At Salmon

SALMON P — Mrs. Georgie White, a well-known wilderness tour guide from Los Angeles, was arrested and pleaded guilty Friday to taking a tour party on an Idaho river trip without a valid Idaho outfitters and guides license.

Her plea was entered before Justice of the Peace Fred W. Call in Salmon, and he fined her \$300.

The license itself would have cost Mrs. White, as an out-of-state resident, \$100. But she contended she shouldn't be required to buy one because she operates her tours on a share-the-expenses basis.

Instead of penalizing her, she said, she should be paid because her tours give Idaho so much good publicity. If Idaho was going to take this attitude, she added indignantly, she wasn't going to bring any more tour parties into the state.

Chairman J. B. Taylor of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides license board was here to serve the warrant when Mrs. White and her party of 16 arrived Friday following a four-day tour down the Middle Fork of the Salmon River in central Idaho's primitive wilderness.

Taylor said Mrs. White had been given ample advance notice of the new law and of the fact that she would need one of the new licenses to operate in Idaho. She had already purchased one of the \$5 licenses required under the law supplanted by the new one.

The law was passed by the 1961 Legislature to regulate guides and outfitters and their qualifications.

Mrs. White is a well-known wilderness guide in the West.
