

OUTFITTERS AND GUIDES BOARD

December 1-5, 1980

Boise, Idaho

Monday, December 1, 1980, all members of the Outfitters and Guides Board met at 8:30 a.m., in their Boise office, with Chairman Rex Lanham presiding, Jim Baughman, Bill Guth, and Ivol Sies in attendance.

Minutes of the October 21, 22 & 23 meeting were read and approved by motion of Ivol, second by Bill; also, the November attorney expense was approved to be paid.

Discussion of walk & wade fishing for outfitter Webb on the Henry's Fork, the F. & G. Department will be contacted for their input. Dave Burk's request for a board hearing was reviewed--a final letter will be mailed, as they continually postpone the appointments set.

Bear and Cougar Area Consolidation (Lemhi & Custer areas) was again discussed; it was determined the Board will set up two separate areas at present for combo licensing of a number of outfitters in each with notation that the proposal is a study to be reviewed in the spring of 1982, for relicense consideration. A letter was composed which named 23 licensed outfitters in the "Custer Area" and 17 in the "Lemhi Area"--copies will also be sent to Challis & Salmon F.S., the BLM in those areas, and the Idaho F. & G. Department. The proposal will also be a part of the agenda to discuss with those representatives Tuesday.

Outfitter & Guide Business was the next business with Dennis Sergeff approved for licensing of the released Peck area--Sergeff's partner, Brian Simi, will license as an outfitter next licensing, he is presently licensed as a guide--Sergeff's license will be for advertising until next season. A letter was approved to be sent to Joel Bender, guide for Carl Russell's Wilderness Encounters, who has complained about not being paid--former M.A., Bill Bender had a similar problem. The F.S. hesitancy to permit the Ray Tarbox proposed buyer and Harry Vaughn's proposed sale of business, which the F.S. has written a letter advising a moritorium on "new" permits will be discussed at the Board/F.S. meeting Tuesday.

Enforcement Problems were then reviewed when Randy Ross came in to report on the Wayne Beuke case at Lewiston--Judge Ron Schilling had started off with mentioning that a maximum fine of \$10.00 is all that would be imposed and that Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Steve Tobiason said the Outfitters & Guides laws were written improperly (causing laughter in the court during the Beuke case). The Board decided to have Randy explain this to the Board's attorney and they would instruct Guy to look into the Nez Perce court situation. The federal case of Steve Weiber killing a bear in Idaho was brought up--Weiber received a \$600. fine withheld judgement. Cecil will cite for the state. And, although Tim Steele was not found guilty on the state case by Judge Schilling, he will be brought up on a federal charge. The Board further decided this biased court situation would be discussed at the F.S. meeting.

Randy also mentioned his friend, Dave Soblewski did testify and submitted Dave's expense slips. He mentioned too a report of Don Duckworth hauling Idaho hunters with his Coast Guard permit, before he left the meeting.

The Board continued with enforcement & investigation business which included a F. & G. report that Bob Buehler's hunting reserve was out of business--he has lost his permit.

Enforcement Officers will be notified to attend the Assn. meeting with expenses only paid was decided, then there was discussion concerning their employment this past season. It was determined that Dewey did not go into the hunter camps as was the Board's intention, that Dave may have used one too many mules--but overall, good was accomplished by both officers. Ivol felt that Randy should be used every day next summer. The Board then discussed the horse/mule and trailer use reimbursement for the enforcement men--and determined the following pay schedule: \$15.00 per day, riding horse in use; \$10.00 per day, pack animal in use; \$5.00 per day, animals on standby; and, 20¢ per mile trailer use. This will be discussed with the investigators when they come in for the Assn. meeting. Then lunch recess was called.

After the lunch recess, all members worked on Outfitter & Guide Business again and determined that Larry Moats' request for elk/deer area be denied--per Idaho Code 36-2109, b4 & b5--the Board's decision is upheld by both the Forest Service and Fish and Game.

also Harry Lewies request for walk & wade fishing on Henry's Fork and Buffalo Rivers-- would be approved said the Board if an extension fee is submitted, and Dean Seely's area was checked on the map for snowmobile licensing.

At 2:15 p.m., John Jackson, Ramshorn Lodge at Shoup, Idaho and his brother-in-law, Nolan Carter, Jr. of Salmon and John's son, Neil Jackson came in to meet with the Board about taking over William Crombie's outfitting business. Jackson said he backed Crombie to a total of \$50,000, and that Crombie has turned over all equipment and stock. A legal release was given by Crombie and he has left the state presumably as the F.S. can't find him. Mr. Jackson objected to showing total assets in a written financial statement. The partners were advised to file enough to show that the business would be stable. Also needed, is a partnership bond, before licensing.

The next appointment was Harry Vaughn, Moscow, Tim Craig, Peck and Tim's brother, Bruce Craig, Idaho Falls, and Tim's father-in-law, Don Wilson, Mandan, N.D. Mr. Wilson is purchasing Harry Vaughn's business and they proposed that Tim will be Managing Agent and have his brother's help as a guide to run both the Craig (old Kuykendall) outfit and the new area business.

The F.S. letter written by District Ranger Barry Hicks was read about a moratorium on new permits. The Board agreed with the outfitters, that this permit should not be classed as a new permit, and would contact the F.S. further on this. Harry feels the F.S. want to thin out existing businesses using the Moose Cr. airstrip etc. Craig said he would run both business as one and planned to incorporate in a year or two.

Before Tim left the meeting, he was also talked to about threatening hunters in his area and calling the Board's enforcement to check into it--Mike has given a report on this.

Outfitter Complaints were read next--2 letters from clients of the new Indian Lake Outfitter, Richard Nelson, M.A.--he will be required to meet with the Board on these; Travis York also must explain a complaint; Dave Stucker's complaintants were do-it-yourselfers who had contacted the sheriff about a horse incident; and, a letter will be sent for more information on the George May client's complaint. The meeting then recessed at 5:15 p.m.

Tuesday, December 2, 1980 all members reconvened at 8:30 a.m., with the first appointment, Dick Clark, M.A. of Rick's College coming in. Mr. Clark reported that representatives of Rick's College met with three Teton River outfitters: Harry Lewies, Glen Foster and Lyle Kunz (Randy Berry was running a ski shop clinic and was not there, nor was Laren Piquet) Mr. Clark says they agreed to a proposal which will be signed by these Teton River outfitters and sent to the Board which would involve a section of the Teton River--3 to 5 river miles just above Hwy 33--Cache Bridge (next to Tetonia), north to Hwy 33 Bridge. Also agreed to, was maximum number and season of use--during fishing season, cut groups in one-half, and will follow the rules and regulations of the Board.

Mr. Clark then questioned five other outfitting interests the school has in mind:

- 1) They feel they have "grandfather" rights--Rex explained the Board's concern for rights of all, including public's use and other schools too, and mentioned the Rick's school's legislative efforts and what effect it would of had if passed;
- 2) Limitation of backpacking and trailriding, as licensed--Board showed the maps presented for the Board to work with and that others had areas licensed. However there was agreement to license the additional area south of Bonneville Co. line and north to Pine Cr. road, if an extension fee is paid;
- 3) Use of Henry's Fork--Board explained a formal hearing is needed to change the limits;
- 4) Fall River boating--Board said it was not open and public protests opening it as it is an excellent fly fishery; and
- 5) Ricks wants special trips outside their licensed area--the Board explained the law restricts but if a letter with F.S. approval from each district was presented, the Board would certainly consider their proposal.

Boating Business was the next business to be reviewed: 1) Island Park F.S. report that Tom Webb has been 4 years goose hunting without obtaining a permit but not caught--also John Hill hasn't obtained a permit for his operation on the Henry's Fork. 2) Boater Bob Doppelt dba Oregon River Experiences letter request for a change in the rules--Board says no, that rule 26B exception would cover his operation--a letter will be sent. 3) Jerry Kooyer's report that James Gellein had skipped with \$50,000 of the company funds;

4) Owyhee and Jarbidge/Bruneau Rivers--the Board will contact BLM about their moritorium being continued; 5) the F.S. letter was read about limiting the St. Joe River to two commercial operations; and 6) Dot Handy, Jerome & Stanley, met with the Board to license as a managing agent with the name changing to Eldon Handy's Salmon River Expeditions, Inc., which was incorporated with Dot as the sole owner. She mentioned she plans to license two managing agents next season for the two river operations, one for each river business. The Board advised there would be no reason for a F.S. signature until the 1981-82 licensing.

The Board then reviewed F.S./BLM/F&G business prior to adjournment for lunch and the afternoon meeting with those various officials at the Holiday Inn, Boise.

Tuesday afternoon, December 2, 1980, Outfitters and Guides Board members, Chairman Rex Lanham, Jim Baughman, Bill Guth and Ivor Sies convened at 1:40 p.m. in Maui Room of the Holiday Inn, with 31 guests representing the Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Idaho Fish and Game Department, Idaho Outfitters and Guides Association, and two members of Colorado Outfitters and Guides Association--a list of those present is attached as a part of these minutes.

The federal court cases of Wayne Bueke and Tim Steele in Lewiston court were discussed; also the pending case of Mike Luther. There was suggestion that the state tag along on the federal cases, but something needed done about the Lewiston court. Suggestion that area outfitters talk to the court officials too as there is not much respect for Idaho O & G law. Also that an outfitter witness would be beneficial and might have helped the Beuke case.

Boise BLM mentioned a rate raise being considered on the Owyhee, Lower Salmon, Snake and Payette rivers--Bill suggested advance notice to the outfitters. They also asked the Board's continued support of their environmental study moritorium--a letter will be sent.

Cottonwood BLM mentioned that Washington schools using the rivers in Idaho have state support and compete with the outfitters, and that there is rumored a lawsuit may be instigated which would drag the Board in. Rex mentioned the Board is working out problems with Ricks College, and that the Board's interest was mainly in safety and their capabilities, and when a school specifically hires guides, or the instructors set themselves up summer jobs, as Bill suggested, the Board cannot ignore what's happening and must insure all those using Idaho, to do so safely.

Problems of permit transfer in a sale of the outfitter (Tarbox) business then came up. Region IV representative, Frank McElwain suggested that since there was not a representative from that district present, that a directive had been sent down which was now recinded--9/19/80 letter. Region I Jim Dolen said he would look into it.

Then a letter was read concerning a moritorium of "new" permits which the District Ranger construed to mean that when an existing permit is released, it then becomes "new" for outfitter business buyer. Barry Hicks explained his letter--saying that Harry Vaughn would not be affected, but that he wanted a 1-year moritorium to keep stability for the Wilderness Analysis. Jim suggested the Board would like to see stability too but this should not stop outfitting from changing hands. Rex mentioned too, it is an expanding industry.

The F.S. feel they should have more control over the permit transfers, they said. Bill mentioned that the Board should take a closer look at new applicants and there was need for outfitters to get more qualified people. Frank Elder mentioned that there must be continued cooperation between the agencies and the F.S. supports the Board and their laws to protect the public. But he says, area boundaries assigned do not always fit well with the F.S. management and there's some conflict in the state law and land management. Assn. President Norm Guth suggested the Board should set themselves more stringent standards for outfitters to meet, but that it should be a state concern and the Forest Service not try to control the commerce of the state. Frank Elder responded saying it was a question of who's managing the land, if the Board set the areas, the F.S. land management advocates their authority--that a continued contact between agencies and meeting of this sort are very necessary. Jim mentioned the years of work between the agencies to sort out areas etc. Then Frank said if Board selects good people and they work together, no problems for anyone.

There were other outfitter problems brought up: Illegals using area cheat both the state and federal--Jim Dolen, Region I, passed out material compiled on illegals and posters to help stop their operation; Big Creek was mentioned and McElwain said the F.S. were aware and would try to rectify; Bill mentioned Dave Williams in old Dale Ney area with a limited license and no camps--Dick Bacon said F.S. felt there was enough public use & the muzzle loaders use the area; and, there was discussion over the Eakin Ridge area being licensed for big game--Frank Elder mentioned Hanson had been upheld in court for this area.

Boating was discussed--Rex mentioned the Middle Fork River limits were good--then there was much discussion over allocations of permits being challenged by privates. Clifton Blake said the F.S. were taking it serious and would appraise the Board further on this--he has a letter he'll send to the Board on it. Art Seamons, Hell's Canyon NRA said Wild & Scenic Management Plan has changed boundaries and management is by Wallowa-Whitman N.F., Al Defler, Enterprise, OR, Project Manager now and Art works under him handling the river permits. There was quite a bit of discussion on the Snake River management--Art says the F.S. is going to start checking licenses but Oregon & Idaho laws are vastly different--Oregon control by F. & G. and Marine Board. Elwood Masoner mentioned Oregon does not license, only a matter of registration, and Art continued that the F.S. have a problem with compliance with both state agencies for permits. Jim mentioned use of Idaho for most all floats and center of river division between the states. Art suggests river cases are hard to win and suggested a reciprocal agreement between the states. He mentioned a White Water conference at Missoula to be held on March 24-26 which he would like the Board to attend.

Subcontracting was brought up--all agencies agreed it was illegal. Jim explained to Frank's question on leasing extra boats, the Board has determined that equipment (boats etc.) may be leased but not the operator or his services; he must be on an employee basis and licensed as a guide.

Next, brought up was the Spring Bear/Cougar combination of areas for Salmon and Challis areas--requirement of large areas by the nature of the way the animals are hunted. Jim Moorhead said it's being done illegally anyway. Dave Lee asked about the SNRA, and the Board answered that it would be skirted. F.S. ranger Dick Bacon and F. & G. Jim Keating both registered concern for the privates verses the commercial in use of these larger areas. Ivöl explained that F. & G. could not manage areas that are locked up, as some are by outfitters licensing but not using their areas. Keating also suggested that Tom Reinecker be appraised of the proposal--Ivöl answered that the Board has several letters from the Department and that it is well known. Keating said, if over use, areas could be closed. Other Forest Service representatives asked about the rest of the state--the Board answered probably will follow, but opening as proposed. It was further explained, in answer to the Colorado Assn. representatives, that although bear and cougar have been big game for Fish and Game purposes, they are predators and not licensed the same as big game by the Outfitters and Guides Board.

The Board then asked if any more questions or business, and there being none, the meeting adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

Wednesday, December 3, 1981 (Holiday Inn, Boise) Board members, Jim Baughman, Bill Guth and Ivöl Sies met with outfitter Joe Leonard for a request of an opinion on the ski guide's experience of Ben Franklin who has applied to guide for Kirk Bachman; and, the experience of outfitter-guide Jerry Carlton, Burgdorf.

Joe mentioned the differences between exams--he said that Backcountry Ski Guides Assn. (IBSGA) exam was more strict--survival included, over either PSIA or PNSIA. But because of the shortage of certified guides, the skiers group propose to request the Board to consider licensing guides who have passed the written exam and later when the physical exam is taken, if it is failed, to cancel their licenses. Joe said the exams should be moved up from January but guides should look ahead a year. He also mentioned the difference in ski terrain between himself and Joe Tonsmeire and what Galena and Buster-back offers. This meeting adjourned at 10:15 a.m.

At noon, Wednesday, December 3, 1980 (Holiday Inn) Travis York, M.A. for Wally York & Sons met with all four board members, Rex, Jim, Bill and Ivol. The Board asked him about a Wisconsin 4-party hunting complaint.

Travis explained and refuted a number of points, but agreed that his attitude was not the best. There was a misunderstanding on the last day's hunt but they left early that day by their own decision, and did not hunt on the way out as Travis said counts as one of the days for hunting. The party of four got one bull which was about average take for the area, but Travis said they were unsportsmen (the one bull was shot 10 times--he had to dress it), and he would not have them back. The Board told Travis he was not diplomatic enough--to show more finesse in dealing with his clients.

The second complaint was over a California man cancelling in 1980 because of his son's injury and knee operation. Rebooked for 1981, then asked for refund. Travis said he was short one hunter because of the cancellation and told the client he would refund if he filled the vacancy. He said he had tried to reach this client but will again try to make contact to settle on the deposit refund. The meeting adjourned for a late lunch.

Wednesday, December 3, 1980 P.M.--Association Meetings, Holiday Inn

The members of the Board attended various Association meetings for the balance of the day. During the Assn. Hunter meeting, Jim Baughman was called upon to talk--he explained what determined guiding according to the Outfitters and Guides law and rules & regulations. Also the requirement of notification when guides move from outfitter to outfitter.

The Red Cross certification for guiding was discussed. Mr. Baughman said an instructors letter of notice that the course was taken and passed, would suffice when cards are long in coming.

Thursday, December 4, 1980 (Holiday Inn), Three members of the Board--Jim, Bill and Ivol, met to discuss the Beuke case. Norm Riddle has been contacted and would not appear as a witness for the state cases at Lewiston. Guy suggested transfer of cases to Ada County as a possible answer. A letter was discussed to be sent to the Lewiston outfitters to contact the prosecuting attorney there; also the court problem will be mentioned at the afternoon Boating Committee meeting.

The meeting then moved to Rex's room, where enforcement officer, Dewey Cavin, joined the meeting. There was discussion over the amount of time Dewey had worked this summer and what he thought he would be working--8 or 9 months as he said he understood from Eldon.

Jim explained again that some investigators work only to a total of 108 days per year, and that it had been explained to him that his job would probably only be up to 125 days per year. All the board members agreed and Rex said never has the enforcement job been considered full time.

Dewey asked about insurance which he understood from Eldon, would be available--his wife has had open-heart surgery and may need more coverage. It was explained that part-time employees are ineligible.

Dewey said he enjoyed the work, but unless wages could be increased, he would probably have to locate something else as he couldn't handle it financially. Rex said it was a thankless job but the Board appreciated Dewey jerking the outfitters around a bit.

Then Jim said he objected some to Dewey not going into the hunter's camps. Dewey agreed he had only rode into Gladys York's camp.

The horse and trailer use was discussed and the pay the Board has agreed upon for reimbursement to the investigators. Dewey said it was okay, but less than what the F.S. pays.

The investigation of Tim Gardiner's operation--advertising Silver Creek was explained as erroneous, F. & G. case abandoned. Dewey mentioned that Gardiner advertises the Copper Basin and has no agreement with Lon Jarvis, whose area is used and thinks he ought to be nailed. Dewey asked about outfitter Bitton being cited, and the pending Challis court case on Bitton's guides was discussed. The meeting adjourned at 11:00 a.m.

Thursday, December 4, 1980 PM--Association Meetings (Holiday Inn) The Board joined the Ski Group and were asked about Galena Lodge situation. There is a shortage of ski guides available to them and the state's licensing requirement of certification was the problem. The Board explained the O. & G. law and rules & regulations say specifically what is required, and the Board would need a hearing for rules to be changed.

Dan Hamilton said they have safe, machine-groomed trails with new equipment, with National Ski Patrols and all have had advanced first aid training.

Frank McElwain, Region IV F.S. representative mentioned the F.S. has given Galena Lodge a unique permit--one that would be experimental, different than the outfitter cross-country ski permits given others, because of their type of skiing.

Hamilton argued that they should have an exception to the rules for their ski guides as they only give instruction, etc.

Dan Rotthoff suggested a committee to formulate some rules changes. Joe Leonard said it would not be the intent to change the guide--lead guide qualification, but they would present some recommendations for the Board. Dave Lee, SNRA said he felt the ski certification requirements should remain the same.

The Board left this meeting at 3:15 p.m. and then Jim, Bill and Ivol convened for a short meeting.

The Board discussed the bear/cougar area combination for licensing again. There was some reservation on going ahead with licensing without more input. Ivol said he felt the Board should be unanimous--they determined to get more input. Recess was called at 5 p.m.

Friday, December 5, 1981 (Holiday Inn) At 9:15 a.m., the managing agent, Richard Nelson, of Indian Lake Outfitters, Darby, MT, met with the four board members in Rex's room to discuss two complaints received by the Board. Dave Giles also sat in on the meeting.

The first, from client Krinke, who was unhappy over not being informed of the change of management and he expected to hunt with Tom Drinville, was agreed not to be too serious, but Mr. Nelson was advised this should of been done.

The second complaint was from client Funk, which named a number of things wrong with his hunt. Mr. Nelson explained the poor cooperation of Tom Drinville, late licensing had caused problems in getting experienced guides, etc. He further said the Funk group was belligerent, only interested in trophy bulls and tried to bribe their guide to get a trophy for the client's son, etc. The Board said they understood some of his problem but thought the deer meat that was supposed to of been sent should be immediately. Nelson said it was frozen and in good shape, but hadn't gotten hold of an address to ship it. The Board requested that he do so immediately.

After Mr. Nelson left, Dave Giles asked about the Board's enforcement work for him. He said he wanted to leave on a vacation and also had another part-time job he could do, riding for a rancher. The Board said this would work out fine with them, they believed there could be some additional investigation for him, but if a problem, another officer could check on the snowmobilers.

The horse hire was reviewed--Dave said it was fine with him. He further said he felt he needed his extra pack mule, and would take it without pay, either way. The Board agreed they would pay his expense to eastern Idaho. There was discussion over the citation of Mariner Jensen's son, Clyde Jensen and how it was handled in court--Bear Lake County. Jim mentioned that citing the unlicensed guide had served it's purpose, that Mariner Jensen had come to him and thanked him. The Board could cite Mariner on two other counts but has decided against it. The Board thanked Dave on how his investigation was handled.

At 10:30 a.m., Evelyn Sweener, Corvallis, MT, met with the four board members about licensing for outfitter business as her husband had died suddenly and she had ran the outfitting with the help of neighbors this past fall. She said the F.S. checked on her all during the season and felt she had good guides and could do a good job. She will advertise as Birch Creek Outfitters.

The meeting recessed until 12:40 p.m., when the Board convened back at the Board office and worked on formulating a letter and worked out a list of those bear/cougar combo area outfitters to be notified of the Board's plan for licensing. The meeting adjourned at 3:30 p.m.

A list of outfitters and guides who have been licensed, had their licenses extended, amended, or have been denied since the last board meeting, are listed and become a part of these minutes.
