

MINUTES

Idaho Outfitters and Guides Board Boise, Idaho

September 29 and 30, and October 1, 1983

A regular meeting of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Board was called to order by Chairman Glen R. Foster at 0845 on September 29, 1983, in the office boardroom in Boise, Idaho. Other members present were: R. Scott Farr, William R. Meiners, Robert L. Salter and Harry W. Vaughn.

The minutes of the preceding board meeting were discussed; changes and additions were suggested. The revised minutes are to be presented for approval at the next regular board meeting.

A brief discussion about correspondence concerning back-country alpine skiing in the Palisade Ranger District was followed by Foster's report of a telephone conversation with Norman Huntsman, District Ranger. Further discussion of the matter will be held after additional responses are received.

A complaint received from C. David Rose about Miller and Miller River Trips (Andron Corporation, Sharon Miller, M.A.) was reviewed. A letter to Sharon Miller requesting her presence at a board meeting to answer the letter of complaint is to be mailed.

Correspondence regarding the River Rat Express, a shuttle organization, included a letter from Carolyn J. Haslett and a reply from the Board. Upon review of the letters it was decided to take no further action at this time.

The Chairman introduced a copy of a letter sent to Richard E. Grunch by the Avery Ranger District outlining violations which need to be corrected. Foster also mentioned telephone communication with Grunch concerning his guides and the first aid requirement. Brief discussion was followed by a decision to have enforcement personnel check the situation.

Salter led a discussion concerning possession of licenses by guides. Salter moved, Meiners seconded and the motion carried THAT, IN THE FUTURE, THE BOARD'S POLICY BE THAT ANY PERSON CHECKED WITHOUT A VALID GUIDE LICENSE ON HIS PERSON BE ISSUED A CITATION; AND FURTHER, THAT GUIDE LICENSE NUMBERS NOT BE ALLOCATED PRIOR TO ISSUANCE OF THE LICENSE. Vaughn suggested a notice of this decision be introduced to the Outfitters and Guides Association at their December meeting.

Salter reported on his recent meeting with the enforcement officers. He advised the Board that each enforcement officer will be allocated at least 100 hours to check hunting camps during the upcoming hunting seasons. The Chairman mentioned that future plans should include similar enforcement plans for the rivers. Salter briefly reported on recent actions taken by enforcement officers.

It was reported that a letter was received from Patrick Cody's attorney stating that Rick Hussey had returned the full deposit and thanking the Board for its efforts in the matter.

The Ian Magee complaint against Travis York has not been resolved. A review of the Board's August 18, 1983 letter to Mr. Magee was followed by a report of a

telephone call from Mr. Magee on September 1, 1983, in which he stated he is going to pursue legal action. Following discussion, Meiners made a motion THAT MR. MAGEE'S TELEPHONE CONVERSATION INDICATES NO FURTHER ACTION BY THE BOARD IN THIS MATTER, AND THAT THE MONEY BE RETURNED TO MR. YORK IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LETTER OF AUGUST 18, 1983. Salter seconded and the motion passed. A letter is to be sent to Mr. Magee advising him of the Board's decision and action.

The Board reviewed the guidelines dated September 19, 1983, and presented by Clive J. Strong, Deputy Attorney General, concerning licensing of organizations conducting survival schools and church-related outdoor programs.

The members discussed several matters relating to Gerald P. Kooyers and his boating operation on the Salmon River. The topics included: (1) his Petition for Amendment or Repeal of Rule - relating to the overlap of the steelhead fishing season and the float boating season; (2) his Application for Temporary Order and Preliminary Injunction with intent to restrain the Board from actions against perceived violations on the river by boaters during the steelhead season; and (3) the recent dismissal of charges against Kooyers for violation of rules relating to commercial boating during steelhead season. Also included in the discussion was the need to resolve the commercial power and float boat conflict with the walk and wade (bank) fishing. An outgrowth of that discussion was the possibility of rules changes to meet the projected increase in river usage by steelhead fishermen. It was recommended that the Board communicate with the Department of Fish and Game concerning the problem. No further action to be taken until input by legal counsel.

Following distribution of copies of a September 19, 1983 letter from Kurt Burkholder, Deputy Attorney General, the Chairman briefly reviewed the contents: (1) Authority to refund license fees; (2) Authority to restrict licenses; and (3) Decision on applications within ninety days. No further action at this time.

Salter suggested the use of a form letter to gain information from the Department of Fish and Game in order that requested information be available for the board meeting following the inquiry. He also asked for a review of the fifteen most recent inquiries to the Department in order to have data to present in his request to speed their responses to the Board.

Enforcement Officer Al Lewis entered the meeting at 1145 to present brief summaries of the progress of several cases currently under investigation. The cases of Buddy Broussard, Rich Cook and Charlie Ferdon were among those mentioned.

At 1315, Roger Tillis and Don Greer from Grangeville appeared before the board to investigate the possibility of obtaining outfitters' licenses to hunt bear and cougar with hounds. They mentioned the abundance of cougar in the area, and cited their previous outfitting experience as bear hunters in Northern California. After general questioning by the board in an attempt to determine their qualifications and a description of the area they expected to use, they were told to submit applications and a well-defined area description.

Dick and Bobbe Pullin from Pollock, Idaho entered the meeting at 1345 to discuss their purchase of Myrna Beamer's float boating business from Vinegar Creek

to Heller Bar on the Salmon River. Mr. Pullin detailed his qualifications, equipment and general abilities to conduct an outfitting operation. The Board explained the possible future conflict between the steelhead fishermen and the boaters. Following the interview, Farr moved, Vaughn seconded and the motion passed THAT THE LICENSE BE ISSUED WHEN THE APPLICATION IS COMPLETED. Mr. Pullen is qualified for "boatman" but he will need to hire a qualified "lead boatman" for the 1984-85 season.

Buddy Broussard and Paul Lineberger appeared to discuss their past, current and future plans for an outfitter business. Broussard said the proposed hunting operation would take place solely on private land owned by Potlatch Corporation and that he had adequate livestock and equipment, and further, that he would hire one guide.

Discussion continued as Deputy Attorney General Clive Strong entered the meeting. Lineberger stated Broussard had misrepresented many aspects of the business to him, and that he (Lineberger) had terminated his association with Broussard and Swamp Creek Outfitters. Lineberger turned four hunting licenses over to the Board. Broussard and Lineberger left the meeting.

Discussion concerning disposition of the licenses for the hunters booked by Broussard was augmented by suggestions from Strong that Lineberger and Broussard sign releases for the licenses and that the Board seek to obtain refunds from the Department of Fish and Game for James LeBoeuf, Brian A. Blades, Neil R. Harris and Paul E. Blades. Strong left the meeting to formulate the releases and to meet with Broussard and Lineberger. Later Salter reported that a letter of petition will need to be presented in order to refund the money paid for the licenses.

Helmut Augustin from Island Park, Idaho appeared briefly to outline his intended snowmobiling operation. After his departure, Meiners moved, Vaughn seconded and the motion passed THAT, PENDING COMPLETION OF HIS APPLICATION, ISSUANCE OF THE LICENSE BE APPROVED.

Paul Lineberger returned to the boardroom to reiterate his disassociation with Broussard and to state that he is interested in applying for an outfitter license on Potlatch Corporation land in the spring of 1984.

Strong reentered the meeting.

At 1615 Larry Olson, Buhl, Idaho, appeared before the Board to present a request to obtain an outfitter license in order to conduct his School of Urban and Wilderness Survival. His initial questions revolved around: (1) availability of areas because of expressed need to conduct each venture in a different location; (2) the immediacy of gaining a license because of ventures he already has booked; and (3) the possible licensing of many guides because of rapid turnover due to "burn-out". Lengthy discussion of his program and his qualifications as director ensued. Also mentioned were development of a certification program for survival schools and personnel and a desire to be notified prior to check of campsites. Further questions by the Board concerning areas and access, particularly access to the Owyhees followed. After Olson left the meeting, Salter

moved, Farr seconded and the motion carried THAT, IF AND WHEN A COMPLETED APPLICATION IS RECEIVED FROM LARRY OLSON AND THE SCHOOL OF URBAN AND WILDERNESS SURVIVAL, THE BOARD CHAIRMAN BE AUTHORIZED TO ISSUE THE LICENSE, AND (ON AN INTERIM BASIS) THEY BE EXPECTED TO LICENSE THE PROJECT LEADER AND ASSISTANT PROJECT LEADERS AS GUIDES FOR EACH EXPEDITION.

Deputy Attorney General Strong met with the Board at 1750 to review selected topics including: (1) Kurt Burkholder's opinion on "Authority to Refund License Fees"; (2) the need for a statement regarding first aid certification to be placed on the guide application; (3) the need to require a notarized signature on the guide application; (4) the use of an employee as an independent contractor; (5) the relationship of the power to license and the implied power to revoke a license due to non-use; and (6) the possible necessity to modify those activities defined in the Outfitters and Guides Act as "hazardous mountain excursions". Additionally, the Board was advised that a position of non-involvement is the best position to take relative to the transfer of money when an outfitting business changes ownership.

The meeting recessed at 1850.

The meeting reconvened on September 30, 1983, and was called to order at 0830 by Chairman Foster. Salter was absent; all other members were present.

The Chairman introduced a letter from Sportsman's Alliance of Maine about an upcoming vote on an issue concerning the right to hunt big game. The members generally agreed that success by the anti-hunters in Maine might have far-reaching implications for the outfitting business. No further action was taken.

The Chairman briefly outlined board minutes dated February 12-14, March 28, and May 24 and 25, 1979 and other actions by the Board that served to establish moratoriums or study moratoriums for boat licensing on selected rivers. Meiners moved, Vaughn seconded and the motion carried THAT THE BOARD RESCIND THE LIMITATIONS PLACED ON BOAT LICENSING ON VARIOUS RIVERS AS ESTABLISHED BY VARIOUS BOARD ACTIONS IN 1979 AND PROCEED TO LICENSE AS OUTLINED IN THE RULES AND REGULATIONS DATED JANUARY 15, 1982.

William Leavell from Ketchum, an applicant for an outfitter's license as managing agent for L. L. Breckenridge, explained his business experience, his academic background and his qualifications as a guide for cross country skiing and float boating. He briefed those present on the flat track (groomed trail) and back country skiing operations as planned. He also advised the Board that chukar hunting and Hungarian partridge hunting could be removed from the corporation license because of non-use. There was agreement among the members that the fifty dollars (\$50.00) paid on the guide license fee should be applied toward the managing agent license. Meiners moved, Farr seconded and the motion carried THAT, UPON COMPLETION OF THE APPLICATION, THE LICENSE BE ISSUED TO WILLIAM LEAVELL AS MANAGING AGENT FOR L. L. BRECKENRIDGE.

The Chairman reported on a letter from Stephen H. Jones (Alta Ski Lifts of Alta, Utah) and his inquiry about openings on selected rivers. His name is

to be placed on the consideration list for future openings on the rivers, and a letter informing him that the rivers are presently licensed to the maximum allowable number is to be mailed.

Meiners moved, Farr seconded and the motion carried THAT THE APPLICATION FOR GUIDE LICENSE SUBMITTED BY JERRY MALSON BE DENIED ACCORDING TO THE OUTFITTERS AND GUIDES ACT SECTIONS 36-2109, (c) AND 36-2113, 8 AND 14.

Enforcement Officer Lewis again met briefly with the Board concerning enforcement business.

A letter was introduced in which Sun Valley Trekking Company, Inc. asked for float boating on the Murtaugh Section of the Snake River and on the South Fork of the Boise River from Anderson Ranch Dam to Arrowrock Dam. A letter requesting an amendment fee in order to add the section of the Snake River to the license is to be mailed. It was agreed that the South Fork of the Boise River be included in the upcoming hearing to determine advisability of licensing that river for outfitting. Vaughn moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT AN EXTENSION FOR FLOAT BOATING ON THE MURTAUGH SECTION OF THE SNAKE RIVER BE ISSUED UPON COMPLETION OF THE APPLICATION BY SUN VALLEY TREKKING COMPANY, INC.

A feasibility study for the possible purchase of a word processor/computer was considered. Vaughn moved, Farr seconded and the motion carried THAT A FEASIBILITY STUDY BE ORDERED TO DETERMINE THE NEED FOR A DATA PROCESSOR WHEN FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE.

Keith Shanafelt from Carmen, Idaho, a new applicant for outfitting who is in the process of purchasing Frontier Expedition's business on the Salmon River from Iron Creek to Corn Creek, detailed his proposed operation in terms of types of trips, equipment presently owned and purchases planned, size of operation and personal qualifications as an outfitter. After he left the meeting, Meiners moved, Vaughn seconded and the motion passed THAT SHANAFELT BE ISSUED AN OUTFITTER LICENSE UPON COMPLETION OF HIS APPLICATION.

An application by Randy Stone, managing agent for High Adventure River Tours, Inc., generated considerable discussion concerning licensing for float boating, fishing-boating, and fishing on the Salmon River from the first Highway 93 bridge above Challis to North Fork. Farr moved THAT RANDY STONE BE LICENSED FOR THAT SECTION OF THE SALMON RIVER FROM IRON CREEK TO NORTH FORK FOR FLOAT BOATING ONLY - NO FISHING. The motion was seconded by Meiners. The vote was three ayes (Meiners, Farr and Foster) and one dissenting vote (Vaughn).

After a recess for lunch, the meeting reconvened at 1315.

Regarding previous business before the Board, Vaughn moved, Meiners seconded and the motion was approved THAT THE RICHARD TELLER APPLICATION BE APPROVED WHEN POSITIVE CONFIRMATION FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME IS OBTAINED. The motion followed discussion pertaining to Teller's request for walk-wade fishing on the Salmon River from the Highway 93 bridge to Iron Creek and for a revised and reduced area for backpacking.

Linda and Dee Burr, outfitter applicants from Idaho City, entered the meeting to request consideration for a license allowing a sleighride and trailride operation. After questions and comments concerning a more clearly defined area of operation, personnel involved in the operation, livestock and equipment, and financial considerations, the Board suggested that Mr. Burr obtain his first aid certification and guide license as soon as possible in order that he might assist Mrs. Burr in the proposed business. After the Burrs left the meeting, Vaughn moved THAT, UPON COMPLETION OF THE APPLICATIONS FOR BURR ENTERPRISES AND THE MANAGING AGENT, THE LICENSES BE ISSUED. Farr seconded and the motion passed.

The Chairman introduced a letter from Howie Welke who, as a representative of Earth First and the Wyoming Wilderness Association, registered opposition to the proposed licensing of helicopter skiing in the Palisades Ranger District. Discussion ensued; no action taken.

Guy Miller and Stan Wallosyn appeared before the Board to request an outfitter license for float boating on the Salmon River from the mouth of the Middle Fork to Spring Bar. The present owners of the James Ranch plan to purchase the Fisher Creek Company outfitting business from Bob Hayes and to operate it with Guy Miller as managing agent. Discussion of the proposed business and plans for the James Ranch was followed by a statement that Richard Cook's intended lease of the James Ranch would not be forthcoming. Power boating and steel-head fishing on the river were included in the discussion. Because the applications were incomplete, no further action was taken.

Richard Paris from Hailey, representing EPIC Educational Expeditions, Inc., presented the organization's plans for a cross country and Alpine skiing operation. The proposed outfitting business was explained in terms of personnel (Paris as managing agent, Craig Johnson as general manager of the ranch and Julie Meissner as lead ski guide), area (Ramey Creek Ranch), financial status, and source of clients (primarily medical community). He responded to questions by the Board concerning EPIC Expeditions advertising in 1982 and 1983 that included backpacking in the Sawtooths and rafting on the Middle Fork of the Salmon and the Salmon Rivers. He stated that the advertised activities were subcontracted to licensed outfitters. After his departure, Farr moved, Meiners seconded and the motion carried THAT THE APPLICATION BE APPROVED AND THE LICENSE BE ISSUED WHEN THE APPLICATION IS COMPLETE.

The meeting was recessed at 1755.

The meeting reconvened at 0830, Saturday, October 1, 1983. All members were present and, in addition, Deputy Attorney General Clive Strong was in attendance. Chairman Foster recommended that the board go into executive session in accordance with Idaho Code, Section 67-2345, b and f to consider personnel matters and pending litigation. Vaughn moved and Meiners seconded THAT THE BOARD GO INTO EXECUTIVE SESSION FOR CONSIDERATION OF THE AFOREMENTIONED ITEMS. Farr, Meiners, Salter, Vaughn and Foster voted affirmatively. No negative votes were cast.

At 0930 the executive session ended and the regular session reconvened.

Strong presented documents for interrogatories and request for documents pertaining to the Kooyers injunction against the Board. He then reviewed the documents filed by Gerald Kooyers in his attempt to obtain an injunction against the Board relative to boating on the rivers during steelhead fishing season. That was followed by discussion of potential conflict between boaters and steelhead fishermen on rivers as steelhead fishing increases in the future. Factors considered: (1) present rule concerning boating during steelhead fishing season; (2) present and future dates of the fishing season; (3) alleged violations committed by Kooyers relative to boating during the current season; and (4) the Board's ability to criminally prosecute alleged violations under Idaho Code Section 36-2116. Salter moved, Meiners seconded and the motion carried that THE BOARD INITIATE LITIGATION AGAINST KOOYERS, AS THE OUTFITTER, FOR VIOLATION OF IDAHO CODE, SECTION 36-2113, 8. After further discussion, Salter made a motion to modify the previous motion to state THAT THE LITIGATION BE HELD IN ABEYANCE UNTIL THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF RULE 22 (c) (20) IS DETERMINED BY DECLARATORY JUDGMENT OF THE COURT. The modification of motion was acceptable to Meiners and was approved by the Board.

The Board requested action by Strong relative to the following topics: (1) clarification of commercial sport-fishing with particular reference to fishing on man-made and/or natural lakes; (2) a letter from Bill Boyer regarding non-commercial packing operations; (3) drafting of the wording for the modifications and changes of rules and regulations for the upcoming hearing; and (4) possible exemption of the Board from the Administrative Procedures Act.

Verbal and written communication pertaining to Vaughn's application to conduct hunting in the Clearwater National Forest was reviewed. His request for a permit was refused by the Forest Service. The method for determining issuance of permits by the Clearwater National Forest officials was questioned by Vaughn and other board members. A letter will be written to the regional office in Missoula, Montana, to inquire about the method and whether it has been adopted as official forest service procedure. A letter is to be directed to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game concerning Vaughn's request for walk and wade fishing on the Lochsa River, Selway River and tributaries.

Following a report on correspondence with Tom Hansen and his attorney, the Chairman was directed to respond to the attorney.

An amendment request by James Holcomb and Bob Liming for several activities, including forest grouse and chukar hunting, was briefly discussed. The major point included licensing for bird hunting when the outfitter is not licensed for either big game hunting or boating on a river. Later, Salter moved THAT THE AMENDMENT ALLOWING FOREST GROUSE AND CHUKAR HUNTING STAND, BUT THAT IT BE APPROVED AS PROVISIONAL FOR THE CURRENT LICENSE YEAR AND REVIEWED BEFORE APPROVAL IN THE FUTURE. Farr seconded and the Board passed the motion.

The Board discussed the outdoor program of the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Department at Boise State University. Salter moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT THE BOARD SEND A LETTER AND A COPY OF THE OPINION BY CLIVE STRONG, DEPUTY ATTORNEY GENERAL, TO BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY.

The next meeting of the Board was set for October 26, 27 and 28, 1983.

Gary Madsen's extension request for additional area for hunting was introduced by the Chairman. It was noted that Lon Haley is presently licensed for the requested area. The request is to be denied and the circumstances explained.

Bob Blackadar's requested extension for power boating on the Salmon River from Iron Creek to North Fork was reviewed. Farr moved, Salter seconded and the motion carried THAT THE EXTENSION BE APPROVED.

Following a lunch recess, the Board reconvened at 1255 with Salter and Meiners absent.

A complaint by Steve Black, representing Gem State Sportsmen, was reread and an additional complaint by Art Seamons detailing undesirable conduct by Gary Armacost was reported to the Board. Any further action to be taken will be based on results of the investigation.

A letter to Don Stevens, managing agent for Orange Torpedo Trips, Inc. concerning fraudulent first aid cards submitted by guides was read. No further action was taken.

A recent letter to Bob Cole regarding the "common area realignment boundary" was read. No further action taken.

Michael D. Ducharme's application for an extension for fishing was reviewed. Foster, after discussion with Dale Baird and others, recommended further communication with the Department of Fish and Game. Vaughn moved THAT ANOTHER LETTER BE SENT TO THE FISH AND GAME LISTING ALL LAKES ASKED FOR IN THE APPLICATION. Farr seconded and the motion passed.

Meiners returned to the meeting.

The Chairman reported that a letter had been written to Ms. Debby Walther of Cambridge, MA regarding her claim against John Jones and Carl P. Russell for deposit money for a Middle Fork float trip. No response has been received.

No application has been received from Woodworth and Morache concerning their proposed business. The rivers they requested are to be placed on the list for the hearing.

The Chairman reported that a budget had been prepared and submitted. The budget and the October financial statement were reviewed with those present.

A list of licenses issued, extended, amended, denied and revoked follows as part of these minutes.

There being no further business to come before the Board at this time, the meeting was adjourned at 1430.
