

MINUTES

Idaho Outfitters and Guides Board
Boise, Idaho

February 15, 16, and 17, 1984

A regular meeting of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Board was called to order by Chairman Glen R. Foster, at 0830, February 15, 1984, in the office boardroom at Boise, Idaho. Other board members present were: Robert L. Salter, William R. Meiners, Scott Farr and Harry W. Vaughn.

Changes to the Outfitters and Guides Act proposed for legislative action were reviewed. It was agreed by the Board that lowering of the minimum fine for violation of the act to \$100 would help as an incentive for county prosecution on alterations of first aid cards. It was also agreed that the Board would review an increase of outfitter bond with the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Association prior to any legislative proposal to change it.

The Hill's fish and game conviction was discussed. Then Meiners moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT THE BOARD GO FORWARD WITH THE HEARING AS SCHEDULED, GRANT NO POSTPONEMENTS IN THE SKULL CREEK OUTFITTERS, INC., TODD HILL, M.A., ET AL CASE.

Steve H. Jones and Joanna Erdman, Alta, Utah, appeared before the Board representing a partnership of Jones and Cully Erdman dba Seven Devils Adventures, who are proposing float boating on the Payette River, Banks to Black Canyon Dam, the South Fork of the Payette from the Middle Fork to Banks, and the North Fork of the Payette from Cabarton to Smith's Ferry. Mr. Jones asked for immediate indication on whether licensing may be considered, if the applications are complete, so additional boats and equipment may be purchased.

Following the Jones and Erdman meeting, Farr moved, Meiners seconded and the motion passed THAT IF INVESTIGATION REVEALS SPACE IS AVAILABLE ON THESE SECTIONS OF THE PAYETTE RIVER THAT THE STEVEN H. JONES PARTNERSHIP APPLICATIONS BE APPROVED UPON COMPLETION AND THAT OTHER PERSONS ON THE CONSIDERATION LIST BE NOTIFIED OF SPACE AVAILABLE.

Discussion followed by board members of first aid card validity through the license year. It was agreed that current rules must be followed until any new regulations are adopted.

The Board recessed at 1200 hours for a hearing on Proposed Rules and Regulations Amendments to be held at the Idaho Department of Fish and Game conference room from 1300-1600 hours.

At 1520, all members reconvened at their Boise office boardroom, and continued the meeting, with discussion on Dave Stucker's request for additional cougar hunting area. Salter moved, Meiners seconded and the motion passed THAT THE DAVE STUCKER REQUEST FOR COUGAR HUNTING BE DEFERRED UNTIL THE MARCH MEETING WITH A FIRM RESOLVE THAT IT BE HANDLED ONE WAY OR ANOTHER AT THAT TIME. ADDITIONAL CONTACT WILL BE MADE WITH THE FISH AND GAME DEPARTMENT TO CLEAR UP THEIR POSITION ON THE MERITS OF ADDITIONAL COUGAR HUNTING. MR. STUCKER'S 1984-85 LICENSE SHOULD BE HELD IN ABEYANCE UNTIL A DECISION IS MADE ON THIS MATTER.

Following review of Larry Jarrett's license wording, it was determined that a correction should be made on his and Lazy J Outfitter's 1984-85 licensed area.

A letter received from Shoshone District Bureau of Land Management was reviewed concerning Rocky Mountain Fly Shop's not securing a permit for areas being used within the Shoshone District. A letter will be mailed advising the managing agents, Glen Allen and Doug Anderson, that prior to 1984-85 license consideration, a signed supplement III form from the BLM land manager for these areas must be submitted.

A letter will be sent advising Mike Bishop, M & M Outfitters, and Jim Renshaw that in order for their agreement of overlapping use to be considered, it must be precisely defined and outlined on a map with the time of use specified. It must also be signed by all parties involved. To be legal, it must then be approved by the Board and added to the license descriptions.

A request for license amendment to add bear and cougar hunting by Nolan "Red" Woods and Marvin Thack, a new partner for this activity only, was reviewed. Meiners moved, Salter seconded and the motion passed THAT THE BOARD CONTACT THE DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME TO GET THEIR INPUT RELATIVE TO THE REQUEST OF NOLAN WOODS AND MARVIN THACK FOR PARTNERSHIP BEAR AND COUGAR HUNTING IN UNITS 19, 20 AND 20A; AND THAT THE BOARD THEN TAKE APPROPRIATE ACTION AT THE NEXT BOARD MEETING.

Meiners discussed the proposed BLM land disposal. It was agreed that the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Association should be made aware of these land sales, and Salter advised he would check with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game for their position on the matter. A letter from Bugle Point Outfitters and a copy of the Forest Service's Environmental Assessment concerning the opening of roadless areas for timber sales was also reviewed.

The Chairman briefed the Board on the new Oregon law requiring registration of outfitters and guides.

The meeting recessed at 1715 for an evening hearing session from 1900-2100 hours on Proposed Rules and Regulations Amendments, held in the Boise conference room of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

Thursday, February 16, 1984, all members reconvened at 0830 in the Boise office boardroom. Those present were Chairman Foster, Robert Salter, William Meiners, Scott Farr and Harry Vaughn.

Deputy Attorney General Clive Strong joined the meeting at 0900 and discussed the rules hearing procedure and proposed legislation to affect some changes to the Outfitters and Guides Act.

Marilyn Roorda, Deputy Attorney General conducted a Hearing at the Board's offices for Revocation or Suspension of the license of Charles A. Stovner, Council, Idaho. John Stover was also present during the hearing. The hearing was recorded.

Following discussion of how outfitter board members may obtain amendments to their own licenses during tenure on the Board, Meiners moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT IN ORDER TO AVOID A POSSIBLE CONFLICT OF INTEREST, THE CHAIRMAN CONTACT THE PRESIDENT OF THE IDAHO OUTFITTERS AND GUIDES ASSOCIATION AND REQUEST THAT HE APPOINT A THREE-PERSON COMMITTEE FROM MEMBERS OF THE ASSOCIATION TO REVIEW LICENSE AMENDMENT/EXTENSION REQUESTS THAT ARE RECEIVED BY THE BOARD FROM BOARD MEMBERS WHO ARE OUTFITTERS. THIS COMMITTEE WILL MAKE A RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD WHICH WILL MAKE A FINAL DETERMINATION. THE AFFECTED MEMBER WILL ABSTAIN FROM VOTING DURING THIS TRANS-ACTION.

Ron Gillett, Stanley, Idaho, appeared before the Board to request that fishing be added to his boating license. This was left off his license in 1978 when he bought the business from Vernon Johnson. He also asked about mountain lake fishing being added to his business license and about his possibilities of locating a sheep hunting area. The Board warned Gillett about floating hunters into the Middle Fork of the Salmon in violation of rule number 33 of the Rules and Regulations.

Following this meeting, Salter moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT DESPITE THE BOARD'S MOTION OF DECEMBER 9, 1983, THAT GILLETT BE LICENSED FOR FISHING ON THE UPPER SALMON THE SAME AS THE AREA WAS LICENSED WHEN THE BUSINESS WAS PURCHASED FROM VERNON P. JOHNSON IN 1978.

Rex Lanham, Jr., Idaho City, Idaho, appeared on a new license request involving trailrides, sleigh and wagon rides. He would mostly be on his private property but would also use some forest service land. After Lanham left the meeting, Salter moved, Meiners seconded and the motion passed THAT WHEN IT IS COMPLETED, THE APPLICATION OF REX LANHAM, JR. BE APPROVED.

Robert Cole, Managing Agent for Middle Fork Lodge, Inc., Attorney James Bennetts, and Brent Hill, Challis, came before the Board to resolve a dispute on a common boundary between Sheep Mountain and the Middle Fork of the Salmon river. Maps were reviewed and prior area access and use was discussed, along with input from former area outfitters, Howard Guth and Joe Peck.

Following this meeting, Meiners moved, Vaughn seconded and the motion passed THAT AFTER MEETING WITH MESSRS. COLE, BENNETTS, AND HILL AND HEARING THEIR DISCUSSION AND EXPLANATION OF THE DISPUTED BOUNDARY BETWEEN THEIR AREAS AND BY EVALUATION OF THOSE FACTORS AND IN CONSIDERATION OF OTHER APPROPRIATE RESEARCH AND EVALUATION OF APPLICABLE MAPS, THAT THE BOARD HAS DETERMINED AN EQUITABLE BOUNDARY TO BOTH PARTIES BE DEFINED AS FOLLOWS: STARTING AT SHEEP MOUNTAIN (SEC. 33, T. 15 N., R. 12 E.); THENCE NORTHERLY ALONG THE RIDGE BETWEEN LITTLE LOON CREEK AND SHEEP CREEK TO SLIDEROCK L.O.; THENCE WEST-SOUTHWEST DOWN THE RIDGE TO THE SADDLE BETWEEN NORTH FORK SHEEP CREEK AND WEST FORK OF LITTLE LOON (NE QTR. SEC. 10, T. 15 N., R. 12 E.), APPROXIMATELY 3/4 MILE; THENCE NORTHERLY ALONG THE RIDGE TO THE WEST FORK OF LITTLE LOON CREEK (APPROX. CENTER OF SEC. 35, T. 16 N., R. 12 E.); THENCE CONTINUING DOWN THE WEST FORK OF LITTLE LOON CREEK TO LITTLE LOON CREEK; THENCE DOWN LITTLE LOON CREEK TO THE MIDDLE FORK OF SALMON RIVER; THENCE ACROSS THE MIDDLE FORK OF SALMON TO THE MOUTH OF CAMERON CREEK, ... (AND CONTINUING WITH BALANCE OF UNREVISED DESCRIPTION). REVISED DESCRIPTION TAKEN FROM 1963 TOPOGRAPHIC MAP, USGS SLIDEROCK RIDGE QUADRANGLE & PINION PEAK QUADRANGLE. This motion passed with four "aye" votes. Salter cast a "nay" vote.

Clifford Cummings, Salmon, and his wife Nancy appeared to discuss taking back the outfitting business at North Fork which was released by James Conner. Following the meeting, Salter moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT WHEN THE APPLICATION IS COMPLETE, THAT THE AREA FORMERLY LICENSED TO JAMES CONNER BE LICENSED TO CLIFFORD CUMMINGS FOR 1984-85.

The Board discussed the problems of boat outfitters and flying services transporting hunters to and from back country areas and of advertising for this type of service. It was determined that this would need additional research with other agencies.

Recess was then called at 1800 hours.

Friday, February 17, 1984, Chairman Foster called the meeting to order at 0830. Other members present were Salter, Meiners, Farr and Vaughn.

January income and expenses were reviewed and minutes read. Salter moved, Vaughn seconded and the motion passed THAT THE JANUARY 17-19, 1984, MINUTES BE APPROVED AS CORRECTED. Following reading of the minutes of the Board's meeting with representatives of the Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management and Idaho Department of Fish and Game, Salter moved, Meiners seconded and the motion passed THAT THE DECEMBER 6, 1983 AGENCY MINUTES BE APPROVED AS CORRECTED.

Gary Madsen's request for additional bow hunting area was reviewed. It was determined that further research was needed with the Forest Service, Ted Strickler, and other outfitters in the area.

Thomas Farbo's letter concerning use on the Clearwater river was read. Meiners moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT FARBO'S LETTER REQUEST FOR POWER BOATING ON THE CLEARWATER RIVER HAS BEEN DISCUSSED AND THE LETTER OF DECEMBER 6, 1983, FROM IDAHO DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME REVIEWED. THE BOARD REAFFIRMS ITS POSITION OF NOT CHANGING THE STEELHEAD LICENSING SITUATION ON THE CLEARWATER RIVER UNTIL SUCH TIME AS THE IDAHO DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME HAS HAD TIME TO COMPLETE ITS STUDY.

1984-85 license applications were reviewed for approval. The Board reaffirmed its decision to hold Ernie Duckworth's licenses until he appears before the Board to discuss his involvement in transportation of hunters on the Snake river.

Howard Thompson, Grangeville and Caldwell, Idaho, came in to apply for additional outfitting concerning feral pigs, (reported to be European hogs), he says are in the Weiser to Riggins area. A letter from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, dated February 10, 1984, advised that their regulations do not include feral pigs. More information will be obtained by Thompson and when he completes his application for his regular outfitting business, he will request the new activity and area for the Board's consideration.

Steve Wieber, Asotin, Washington, appeared before the Board concerning a complaint. The Board questioned Mr. Wieber about his understanding of Rule Number 33 on transporting hunters when not holding a license for big game hunting, and advertising in his current brochure. Prior to leaving the meeting, Mr. Wieber asked for a decision on his earlier request to be licensed for bear and deer hunting in the Sheep Creek area along the Snake River.

Following the meeting, Salter moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT THERE BE A LETTER OF REPRIMAND SENT TO STEVE WIEBER FOR HIS ADVERTISING DISCREPANCIES AND THAT HIS 1984-85 LICENSE BE ISSUED ON A PROBATIONARY BASIS.

Following a review of Wieber's request for deer and bear hunting, Salter moved, Meiners seconded and the motion passed THAT THE LICENSE EXTENSION BE DENIED BECAUSE (1) THERE IS PRESENTLY A MORATORIUM ON LICENSING OF ADDITIONAL NEW BEAR HUNTERS, AND (2) THAT THE AREA REQUESTED IS PRESENTLY LICENSED TO THREE OTHER OUTFITTERS.

Loren "Bud" Rogers, dba Hells Canyon Tours, and wife Joan, Asotin, Washington, appeared on a fish and game citation and alleged violation of Rule Number 33 regarding the illegal transportation of big game hunters. The Board warned Mr. Rogers of his responsibility to ensure compliance by himself and guests with Idaho Fish and Game regulations and Rule 33. A list of hunting outfitters licensed along the Snake river was provided Mr. Rogers at his request.

Following the Rogers meeting, Meiners moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT A LETTER OF REPRIMAND BE SENT TO LOREN BUD ROGERS FOR HIS FISH AND GAME VIOLATIONS AND TRANSPORTATION OF BIG GAME HUNTERS, AND THAT MR. ROGERS BE LICENSED ON A PROBATIONARY BASIS FOR THE 1984-85 LICENSE YEAR.

Following discussion of the seriousness of a license being issued "probationary", Meiners moved, Vaughn seconded and the motion passed THAT THE GENERAL POLICY OF THE BOARD SHALL BE AND IS THAT ANYONE ISSUED A PROBATIONARY LICENSE SHALL BE DENIED ANY MODIFICATION OR EXTENSION OF SAID LICENSE DURING THE TERM OF PROBATION. AND THAT ANY OFFICIAL OUTFITTER OR GUIDE LISTING OF THE BOARD WILL IDENTIFY LICENSEES CURRENTLY ON PROBATION.

Farr moved, Salter seconded and the motion passed THAT THE BOARD PURCHASE A 1" X 5" STAMP READING "PROBATIONARY" TO BE USED WITH RED INK TO STAMP THE FACE OF PERTINENT LICENSES.

Jerry Griffin, Caldwell, Idaho, came before the Board to apply as a managing agent for Big Creek Property Owners Association, replacing Dave Stucker. Following the Griffin meeting, Vaughn moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT WHEN THE APPLICATIONS OF JERRY GRIFFIN, MANAGING AGENT, AND BIG CREEK PROPERTY OWNERS ASSOCIATION ARE COMPLETE, THAT THEY BE APPROVED.

The Board members reviewed a complaint on the advertising of Harry Vaughn and his requests for license extension. Farr moved, Meiners seconded and the motion passed THAT THE BOARD WRITE HARRY VAUGHN A LETTER EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN FOR HIS MISLEADING ADVERTISING ON PAGE 35 OF THE 1984 IDAHO OUTFITTERS AND GUIDES ASSOCIATION DIRECTORY AS IT PERTAINS TO THE SELWAY-BITTERROOT WILDERNESS AND THE SELWAY AND LOCHSA RIVERS. THE LETTER SHOULD FURTHER INFORM HARRY THAT IN ORDER TO AVOID MISLEADING THE PUBLIC, THE BOARD POLICY IS THAT IF AN OUTFITTER INTENDS TO ACT AS A BOOKING AGENT, THIS BE CLEARLY SPECIFIED IN ANY OF HIS ADVERTISING. THE LETTER SHOULD FURTHER REQUEST THAT HE CONFORM TO THIS STANDARD IN THE FUTURE. Vaughn abstained from voting.

It was moved by Salter, seconded by Farr and passed THAT THE FOLLOWING POLICY GOVERN THE USE OF PERSONAL EQUIPMENT AND/OR ANIMALS BY EMPLOYEES OF THE BOARD:

1. USE: EXCEPT AS PROVIDED BELOW, THE BOARD WILL NOT PAY AN EMPLOYEE WHEN HE/SHE USES PERSONAL EQUIPMENT/ANIMALS ON BOARD BUSINESS. THE BOARD WILL NOT ACCEPT ANY LIABILITY FOR LOSSES OR DAMAGES TO THE PERSONAL PROPERTY OF AN EMPLOYEE.
2. APPROVAL: WHENEVER PRACTICAL, THE EMPLOYEE SHOULD OBTAIN PRIOR SUPERVISORY APPROVAL TO USE PERSONAL EQUIPMENT/ANIMALS. REIMBURSEMENT CLAIMS, WHEN PRIOR APPROVAL WAS NOT RECEIVED, MAY BE DENIED.
3. REIMBURSEMENT RATES:
 - a. HORSES: (1) IN USE - \$18.00 PER DAY
(2) STAND BY (IN CAMP) - \$10.00 PER DAY
 - b. TRAIL MACHINES: \$10.00 PER DAY
 - c. SNOWMACHINES: (SINGLE) \$25.00 PER DAY
 - d. TRAILING DOGS: \$3.00 PER DAY
 - e. HOUSE TRAILERS/MOTORHOMES: THE BOARD WILL REIMBURSE EMPLOYEES FOR THE USE OF HOUSE TRAILERS OR MOTOR HOMES ONLY IF COMMERCIAL RENTALS ARE NOT AVAILABLE OR WOULD BE IMPRACTICAL. THE EMPLOYEE MUST RECEIVE PRIOR WRITTEN APPROVAL.
THE REIMBURSEMENT FOR USE OF PERSONAL HOUSE TRAILERS OR MOTOR HOMES ACCORDING TO THIS POLICY IS LIMITED TO TEMPORARY SITUATIONS WHERE SUCH USE IS IN THE BEST INTEREST OF THE BOARD. EXAMPLES WOULD BE ASSIGNMENTS TO COMMUNITIES WHERE HOUSING OR REASONABLE MOTELS ARE NOT AVAILABLE.

- (1) OVER 18 FEET - \$13.00 PER DAY
- (2) EIGHTEEN FEET AND UNDER - \$10.00 PER DAY
- f. RIVER RAFTS: (11 FEET AND OVER) - \$18.00 PER DAY
- g. KAYAKS: \$18.00 PER DAY
- 4. DISCRETION: THE BOARD IS COMMITTED TO EXERCISING DISCRETION AND ADMINISTRATIVE CONTROL OVER THE USE OF THESE ITEMS. WE SHOULD MAKE EVERY EFFORT NOT TO ABUSE THIS PRIVILEGE, MAINTAINING GOOD AUDIT TRAIL RECORDS FOR ANY OUTSIDE PERSON WISHING TO EXAMINE THIS PROCEDURE.
- 5. REIMBURSEMENT: REIMBURSEMENT WILL BE MADE UPON RECEIPT OF A SIGNED INVOICE OR STATEMENT.
- 6. SUBMISSION: DOCUMENTS FOR THE ABOVE SERVICES SHOULD BE SUBMITTED WITH THE EXPENSE ACCOUNTS ONCE A MONTH.

A report was made on "Heli-skiing" being advertised in north Idaho, and it was determined that Salter will investigate and send a letter with copies of the law and rules and regulations to those involved.

Grizzly Outfitters license amendments for fishing were reviewed. Salter moved, Vaughn seconded and the motion passed THAT THE AMENDMENT REQUEST OF GRIZZLY OUTFITTERS (HOFF AND DEEDS) BE TABLED UNTIL THE MARCH MEETING BECAUSE OF LACK OF FOREST SERVICE INPUT.

Following review of all material, Meiners moved, Salter seconded and the motion passed THAT THE APPLICATIONS OF ROGER TILLIS AND DON GREER BE DENIED PER IDAHO CODE 36-2109 (b)4. AND (b)5. THAT A LETTER BE SENT ADVISING THAT F & G UNITS 14, 15, AND 16 HAS A MORITORIUM ESTABLISHED WHICH WILL NOT ALLOW ADDITIONAL LICENSING OF NEW BEAR HUNTERS; THAT UNITS 10, 14, 15, AND 16 HAVE ADEQUATE NUMBERS OF OUTFITTERS CURRENTLY LICENSED TO SERVE THE PUBLIC; AND THAT THE AREA IS HIGHLY ROADED, EASILY ACCESSIBLE, AND HEAVILY USED BY THE NON-OUTFITTED PUBLIC.

Following discussion concerning the joint boundary problem between B Bar C, David P. Bobbitt, and the new outfitters of Hole-In-The-Wall, Vaughn moved, Salter seconded and the motion passed THAT THE SOUTH BOUNDARY OF DAVID BOBBITT'S REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL AREA RUN UP LAKE CREEK TO THE CONFLUENCE OF JAP CREEK AND LAKE CREEK AND UP JAP CREEK TO THE IDAHO-MONTANA STATELINE; AND THE NORTHERN ADJUSTMENT IN THE CEDARS AREA RUN UP LONG CREEK TO THE CONFLUENCE OF RAWHIDE CREEK; THENCE UP THE RAWHIDE CREEK TRAIL TO LONG CREEK RIDGE; THENCE UP THE RIDGE TO THE IDAHO-MONTANA STATELINE. FURTHER THAT THE AREA DESCRIPTIONS OF ADJOINING OUTFITTERS BE AMENDED ACCORDINGLY.

Vaughn then moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT WHEN THE APPLICATIONS OF HOLE-IN-THE-WALL AND JEFFREY FREEMAN, MANAGING AGENT, ARE COMPLETE, THAT THOSE LICENSES BE ISSUED, WITH AREA ADJUSTMENT.

Following review of the letters written by the Forest Service on High Country Outfitters, Farr moved, Meiners seconded and the motion passed THAT THE 1984-85 OUTFITTER APPLICATIONS OF QUENTIN SELBY, M.A., AND HIGH COUNTRY OUTFITTERS, INC. HAVE THE LAND MANAGER'S APPROVAL BEFORE THEY ARE ISSUED.

Letters were approved to be mailed to Robert Anderson on his incomplete petition for rule amendments; Robert Jonas on his question of guide fees being carried over to the next year; B. Handrich concerning his inquiry on Jesse Caswell being convicted of outfitting without a license; and Ernie Duckworth and Art Griffith requesting again that they appear before the Board on complaints against their operations.

Following review of a complaint registered against Richard Grunch, Meiners moved, Salter seconded and the motion passed THAT MR. RICHARD GRUNCH BE ADVISED THAT HE MUST APPEAR BEFORE THE BOARD AT ITS MARCH, 1984, MEETING TO ANSWER TO COMPLAINTS AND THAT THE PEOPLE LISTED IN THE COMPLAINT LETTER BE WRITTEN TO FOR ADDITIONAL INPUT.

Salter moved, Vaughn seconded and the motion passed, THAT THE BOARD ADVISE LARRY JARRETT THAT HE CONTINUE TO BE VIGILANT ABOUT THE WAY HE HANDLES PEOPLE HE COMES IN CONTACT WITH WHO ARE HUNTING THE AREA ASSIGNED TO HIM. A letter will be written to Robert M. Smith acknowledging his letter, thanking him for his constructive comments, and advising him that he will not have to appear before the Board at this time.

Letters were also approved to be sent to Mr. Parvin on the Joseph outfitters' complaint, giving the bond number, as requested, and to Leo Crane thanking him for supplying information on his former guide, Tom Pospisil.

Meeting business being completed, Meiners moved, Farr seconded and the motion passed THAT THERE BEING NO FURTHER BUSINESS, THIS MEETING BE ADJOURNED AT 2140 HOURS.
