DECEMBER 9-11, 1993

APPROVED MINUTES

A regular meeting of the Licensing Board convened at 8:30 AM on December 9, 1993, with members Leo Crane, John A.K. Barker, and Dale Baird present. Also present were the Executive Director, Dean Sangrey, Board Education/Enforcement Supervisor, Bill Vetesy, and Board Attorney, Mr. Steve Scanlin.

Financial Report: The Board reviewed the current financial condition reports, as presented by the Executive Director. After review and discussion, MSC (Crane--Barker) THAT THIS REPORT BE ACCEPTED.

Legislative Audit Review: The Board reviewed the report of the Legislative Services Office regarding the audit of the Licensing Board for FY 1991 and 1992. After a review and discussion, MSC (Crane--Barker) THAT THIS REPORT BE ACCEPTED AS PRESENTED AND THAT THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S RESPONSE AND THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE BE IMPLEMENTED.

Guide Licenses Issued: The Board reviewed the guide licenses that have been issued since the last Board meeting. After review and discussion, MSC (Barker--Crane) THAT THE BOARD APPROVE THE ISSUANCE OF THESE LICENSES.

Executive Session: Pursuant to Section 67-2345(1)(d), Idaho Code, MSC (Crane--John) THAT THE BOARD GO INTO EXECUTIVE SESSION FOR THE DISCUSSION OF RECORDS THAT ARE EXEMPT FROM DISCLOSURE AS PROVIDED IN CHAPTER 3, TITLE 9, IDAHO CODE. Board went into Executive Session at 11:10 AM, and came out of Executive Session at 11:20 AM, with no decisions made.

Proposed Rule Adoption: Board legal counsel, Steve Scanlin, presented a report concerning final adoption of proposed rules changes, as described in the attached addendum. After review and discussion, MSC (Barker--Crane) THAT THESE RULES BE APPROVED IN FINAL FORM WITH THE FOLLOWING CHANGES: 1) THAT IDAPA 25, TITLE 01, CHAPTER 01, RULE 072.05, BE AMENDED BY DELETING THE LANGUAGE AT THE END OF THE SENTENCE "VOTING MAY BE HELD BY SECRET BALLOT", AND INSERTING A PERIOD AFTER THE WORDS "MEMBERS PRESENT". (Addendum #1)

Board adjourned for lunch at 11:45 AM, and reconvened at 1:15 PM with Board member Ted Epley now present.

Kirk Bachman and Bob Allen: These members of the Technical Advisory Committee appeared before the Board to discuss concerns relating to timely issuance of guide licenses and to have a general discussion of licensing different levels of technical mountaineering.

Kent Rudeen: Mr. Rudeen appeared before the Board relative to his amendment request to add deer and grouse hunting activities to his current outfitter license. After a review and discussion, MSC (Epley--Crane) THAT MR. RUDEEN'S AMENDMENT REQUEST BE APPROVED, BUT ONLY FOR THOSE LANDS THAT ARE CURRENTLY OWNED BY HIM AS DESCRIBED IN HIS APPLICATION, WITH FURTHER CONSIDERATION TO BE GIVEN TO INCLUDING A 500 ACRE BLOCK OF STATE LAND PENDING COMPLETION OF RESEARCH INTO THE CURRENT USE OF THIS AREA BY RIDGE TAYLOR. (Addendum #2)

Sierra Club Inner City Outings: The Board reviewed a request from Sierra Club Inner City Outings for a ruling as to whether the activities proposed for the upper Salmon River drainage would come under the purview of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Act. After review and discussion, MSC (Barker--Crane) THAT THE ACTIVITIES AS OUTLINED DO FALL UNDER THE PURVIEW OF THE LICENSING BOARD, AND AN OUTFITTER LICENSE WOULD BE REQUIRED FOR THE SIERRA CLUB TO CONDUCT SUCH TRIPS. **Administrative Note:** Executive Director is to advise Sierra Club that the elements of their proposed program do not meet the criteria for licensing exemption under §36-2103, Idaho Code.

Larry Heathington, Sandtank Outfitters: The Board reviewed an amendment request from Mr. Heathington to restructure his authorized allocation of 4 archery deer hunters and 4 rifle deer hunters to 8 deer hunters to be marketed however the outfitter desires. Following a review and discussion, MSC (Epley--Crane) THAT THIS MATTER BE CONTINUED UNTIL THE FEBRUARY, 1994, BOARD MEETING TO ALLOW FOR ADDITIONAL SOLICITATION OF PUBLIC COMMENT REGARDING THE PROPOSED CHANGE.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:20 PM, and reconvened at 8:30 AM, December 10, 1993, with all Board members present.

Probationary Licenses: The Board reviewed the probationary licenses issued to Travis Tracy and John Berry for the 1993-94 season. After review discussion, MSC (Kovalicky--Barker) THAT WHEN EITHER OF THESE INDIVIDUALS APPLIES FOR ANOTHER LICENSE, SAID LICENSE WILL ALSO BE ISSUED PROBATIONARY FOR ONE YEAR.

Ivan Capson: The Board reviewed a guide license application submitted by Ivan Capson. Mr. Capson had indicated he had no convictions for violation of Fish & Game regulations. A check of the records indicated he in fact had violations in 1989 and again in 1992. After review and discussion, MSC (Barker--Crane) THAT THIS GUIDE LICENSE APPLICATION BE DENIED.

Richard Varney: The Board reviewed a guide license application submitted by Richard Varney in which he acknowledged being convicted for a violation of Fish & Game regulations. A check of the records verified Mr. Varney was convicted for possession of three elk in 1987. After review and discussion, MSC (Kovalicky--Barker) THAT THIS APPLICATION BE DENIED.

Nicole McKay, Deputy Idaho Attorney General: The Board was introduced to Ms. Nicole McKay, newly appointed counsel from the State Attorney General's office who will represent the State of Idaho in all disciplinary actions to come before the Licensing Board.

Wayne Hill, Elmer Joe Stuemke, and John Rose: Ms. McKay presented completed stipulated settlements to the Board regarding licensed outfitters Wayne Hill, Elmer Joe Stuemke, and John Rose. Mr. Hill and Mr. Stuemke had been cited for employment of unlicensed guides, and Mr. Rose pled guilty to two violations of federal Forest Service regulations. Based on a review and discussion of these negotiated agreements, MSC (Epley--Crane) THAT THE BOARD ACCEPT THESE STIPULATED SETTLEMENTS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$100.00 EACH FROM MR. HILL AND MR. STUEMKE, AND \$1000.00 FROM MR. ROSE.

Rich Cook, Idaho Outdoor Adventures: Mr. Cook appeared in a show cause hearing regarding the denial of an amendment request to modify his operating area boundary. This proposal involves a request to change the eastern boundary of Mr. Cook's operating area to provide a more suitable area for limited big game hunting in

what is now identified as part of the operating area of Paul Resnick, dba: Shepp Ranch Idaho. After reviewing testimony presented during the hearing, the following Findings of Fact have been established: 1) Current boundary location creates a potential for clients of Cook's Idaho Outdoor Adventures to inadvertently encroach on the hunting area of Shepp Ranch; 2) Heavy use by non-outfitted publics in the immediate area of Idaho Outdoor Adventures' base camp creates a potential for use conflicts between outfitted and non-outfitted users; 3) Shepp Ranch does not use the disputed area during the fall hunting season; 4) Adjustment of the boundary during the fall hunting season will not adversely impact Shepp Ranch, use-wise or economically. Conclusions of Law in this matter are that: 1) A territorial conflict exists between the outfitters; and 2) The safety of persons using outfitted services would be enhanced. Based on these findings, MSC (Epley--Crane) THAT MR. COOK'S OPERATING AREA BOUNDARY BE ADJUSTED TO FOLLOW THE RANGER DISTRICT BOUNDARY COMMON TO RED RIVER AND SLATE CREEK RANGER DISTRICTS EXTENDING FROM TRAIL 313 DOWN THE HYDROLOGIC DIVIDE BETWEEN THE SHEEP CREEK AND WIND RIVER DRAINAGES TO THE SALMON RIVER. HE WILL BE AUTHORIZED TO CONDUCT HUNTING ACTIVITIES FOR DEER, ELK, AND INCIDENTAL FALL BEAR, IN THIS AREA. SHEPP RANCH SHALL RETAIN THE RIGHT TO HUNT SPRING BEAR, COUGAR AND SHEEP IN THE AREA AS CURRENTLY DESCRIBED. (Epley-aye, Baird-aye, Crane-aye, Barker-nay, Kovalicky-aye) (Addendums #3 and #4)

Steve Jones, Weitas Creek Outfitters: Mr. Jones appeared before the Board in a show cause hearing regarding alleged employment of an unlicensed guide and for outfitting without a license in possession. After review and discussion, the following Findings of Fact were established: 1) The two hunters involved had valid hunting licenses and were not convicted of Fish & Game violations; 2) Mr. Jones' father was not transporting hunter's gear on his ATV nor was he providing guiding services to clients of Mr. Jones; and, 3) Mr. Jones did provide guiding services to clients while not having a guide license on his person. Accordingly, the Conclusions of Law are: 1) No unprofessional or unethical conduct occurred; 2) there were no guided services provided by Mr. Frank Jones; and, 3) Steve Jones did conduct guided activities without having his license on his person. Following review and discussion, MSC (Crane--Epley) THAT THE CHARGES INVOLVING UNETHICAL/UNPROFESSIONAL CONDUCT, AND GUIDING WITHOUT A LICENSE, BE DISMISSED. FURTHER, THAT STEVE JONES DID VIOLATE THE PROVISIONS OF LICENSING BOARD RULE 004.01 BY CONDUCTING GUIDED ACTIVITIES WITHOUT HAVING HIS LICENSE IN POSSESSION. FURTHER, THAT STEVE JONES BE SENT A LETTER OF REPRIMAND AND ADVISED THAT NO FURTHER ACTION WILL BE TAKEN AGAINST HIS LICENSE IN THIS MATTER.

Frankie Valvo: Mr. Valvo appeared before the Board in a show cause hearing regarding alleged employment of an unlicensed guide. This was a continuation of a hearing originally scheduled for June, 1992. At the conclusion of the hearing, the following Findings of Fact were established: 1) Frankie Valvo did employ the services of John Stauffer to guide a paying client on a bear hunt; and 2) John Stauffer did not have a valid guide license at the time the incident occurred. Accordingly, the Conclusions of Law are that: Mr. Valvo did employ the services of an unlicensed guide contrary to §36-2113(a)(9), Idaho Code. Pursuant to these findings, MSC (Crane--Epley) THAT MR. VALVO BE FINED IN THE AMOUNT OF \$100.00, WITH NO FURTHER SANCTIONS AGAINST HIS OUTFITTER LICENSE.

Ray Baier, Four Seasons Outfitters: Mr. Baier appeared before the Board in a show cause hearing regarding the alleged provision of outfitted and guided services in an area for which he was not licensed. At the conclusion of the hearing, the following Findings and Fact were established: 1) Mr. Baier did stipulate to the charges as outlined in the Notice of Hearing; and, 2) Mr. Baier did take clients outside of his approved operating area boundary. Accordingly, the Conclusions of Law are: 1) Mr. Baier did violate the provisions of §36-2113(a)(5)(8) and (14), Idaho Code, and Licensing Board Rules 002.45, 004.04(b), and 007.01. Pursuant to said findings, MSC (Kovalicky--Crane) THAT MR. BAIER BE ISSUED A LETTER OF REPRIMAND WITH NO FURTHER SANCTIONS AGAINST HIS LICENSE. (Crane-aye, Kovalicky-aye, Barker-aye, Epley-aye, Baird-nay)

Brundage Mountain/U.S. Forest Service/Sno-cat Skiing: District Rangers Linda Fitch from McCall and David Spann from New Meadows appeared before the Board to discuss the proposed expansion of Brundage Mountain Ski Resort to include sno-cat skiing opportunities. They reviewed different alternatives outlined in the environmental assessment being conducted by the Forest Service, and asked the Board's concurrence in proceeding with the decision-making process. After review and discussion, the Board agreed to consider the potential for licensing Brundage Mountain Company as an outfitter if this is the preferred alternative.

Board meeting adjourned at 5:30 PM and reconvened at 8:30 AM, December 11, 1993, with all Board members present.

Executive Session: MSC (Kovalicky--Crane) THAT THE BOARD GO INTO EXECUTIVE SESSION, PER §67-2345, IDAHO CODE, FOR DISCUSSION OF PERSONNEL MATTERS. (Crane-aye, Kovalicky-aye, Epley-aye, Barker-aye, Baird-aye). Board went into executive session at 8:45 AM, and came out of executive session at 9:05 AM, with no decisions made.

Calvin Sears: The Board reviewed a guide license application submitted by Mr. Calvin Sears. It had been determined that Mr. Sears had submitted an altered first aid card with his application. After review and discussion, MSC (Kovalicky--Barker) THAT, IN LIEU OF A DENIAL OF THIS GUIDE LICENSE, THE BOARD ASSESS A FINE OF \$300.00, WITH SAID FINE TO BE PAID PRIOR TO THE ISSUANCE OF THIS OR ANY FUTURE LICENSE.

Jeff Peavey and Gary Lane: The Board reviewed a petition submitted by Jeff Peavey and Gary Lane requesting that the Board consider taking necessary steps to open the Little Salmon River to commercial floatboating activities. After a review and discussion, MSC (Epley--Barker) THAT THE BOARD ACCEPT THIS PETITION AND PROCEED WITH APPROPRIATE EVALUATION AND RULE MAKING CONSIDERATION.

Chukar Hunting: The Board reviewed the issue of outfitted chukar hunting activities in Idaho, specifically as it relates to incidental and primary licensed activities on outfitter licenses. After review and discussion, MF (Kovalicky--) THAT THE BOARD GO TO RULES MAKING TO ADD THE DEFINITION OF CHUKAR HUNTING AS ALLOWABLE ONLY AS AN INCIDENTAL ACTIVITY, AND ONLY TO BE CONDUCTED IN ASSOCIATION WITH LICENSED FLOATBOATING ACTIVITIES. Motion died for lack of a second. MSF (Kovalicky--Barker) THAT THE BOARD GO TO RULES MAKING TO DEFINE CHUKAR HUNTING IN THE STATE OF IDAHO AS CHUKAR HUNTING INCIDENTAL TO FLOATBOATING OR POWERBOATING ACTIVITIES. (Crane-nay, Kovalicky-aye, Epley-nay, Barker-nay, Baird-nay)

Marriner Jensen: The Board reviewed an amendment request from Marriner Jensen to add additional area to his operating boundary in Fish & Game Management Unit 76 for the purpose of deer hunting, trailrides, and snowmobiling. After a review and discussion, MSC (Epley--Crane) THAT MR. JENSEN'S AMENDMENT REQUEST BE APPROVED TO ENCOMPASS THOSE LANDS DESCRIBED IN HIS APPLICATION AS HIS PRIVATE PROPERTY AND BLM LAND ASSOCIATED WITH THE REQUEST, AS WELL AS A

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SMALL PORTION OF THE CARIBOU NATIONAL FOREST. FURTHER THAT SNOWMOBILING ACTIVITIES BE LIMITED TO SPECIFIED ROUTES AS NEGOTIATED WITH THE LAND MANAGING AGENCIES AND THE IDAHO DEPARTMENT OF FISH & GAME. (Addendum #5)

August Board Meeting Minutes: The Board reviewed the minutes from the August Board meeting. After discussion, MSC (Kovalicky--Crane) THAT THESE MINUTES BE APPROVED AS PRESENTED.

Meeting adjourned for lunch at 11:35 AM, and reconvened at 1:00 PM.

Board Policy/Consideration Of Misdemeanor Convictions: The Board reviewed a suggestion from Education/Enforcement Supervisor Bill Vetesy, to establish a limit of five years for consideration of convictions for violations of fish and game, U.S. Forest Service, or Bureau of Land Management regulations. This limitation would be established as Board policy in consideration of outfitter or guide applications. The proposal would not extend to any felony convictions. After a review and discussion, MSC (Barker--Kovalicky) THAT THE BOARD ADOPT A POLICY OF NOT CONSIDERING FISH AND GAME, FOREST SERVICE, OR BLM MISDEMEANOR CONVICTIONS BEYOND THE FIVE YEAR PERIOD IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING SUBMISSION OF AN APPLICATION FOR AN OUTFITTER OR GUIDE LICENSE AS A BAR TO THE ISSUANCE OF A LICENSE, AND THAT THIS TIME LIMITATION DOES NOT APPLY TO ANY FELONY CONVICTIONS. FURTHER, THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR IS AUTHORIZED TO USE THIS CRITERIA IN EVALUATING AND ISSUING LICENSES WITHOUT PRIOR LICENSING BOARD APPROVAL.

Cindy Burgeson: The Board reviewed a letter of complaint from Cindy Burgeson relative to an outfitted trailride trip with Sherry Nygaard, Lochsa River Outfitters. Following discussion, the Board directed that Chairman Baird contact Ms. Burgeson by letter, advising her of the options that would be available to her in trying to resolve this matter.

Complaints: The Board reviewed the status of additional complaints presently being reviewed by the Executive Director. No formal action was taken on these.

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Forest Service Decision Memo On Bargamin Creek Area: The Board reviewed the Decision Notice presented by the Red River Ranger District regarding the future relicensing of the Gladys York area. District Ranger Ed Wood has selected Alternative 4, which provides that the area be divided among the adjacent outfitters and that the allowed service days be maintained at the current level of operation with the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Licensing Board determining how the area will be divided. Following discussion, MSC (Kovalicky--Epley) THAT THE BOARD ACCEPT DISTRICT RANGER ED WOOD'S DECISION IN THIS MATTER AND PROCEED WITH DETERMINING THE DIVISION OF THE AREA AMONG THE EXISTING OUTFITTERS.

Executive Director's Special Actions: The Executive Director presented a report to the Board relative to special actions and approvals that have been acted on since the August Board Meeting. Included in this report was approval of outfitter licenses for LAWRENCE HILL, JAMES COOK, and STEVE MATTHEWS, and approval of amendment requests for ALBERT LATCH, BRUCE EDWARDS, FLYING B RANCH, TWIN PEAKS RANCH, and MIKE SCOTT. Additionally, designated agent licenses were approved for Jed Wayment, Ray Hamell, Bill Widgren, Larry Hill, Dave Giles, and Marlin Kennedy, and one-time sheep hunts were approved for Indian Creek Ranch, Jim Thrash, Ron Gillett, Stan Potts, and Mike Scott. After review and discussion, MSC (Barker--Kovalicky) THAT THE BOARD APPROVE THESE ACTIONS AS INDICATED.

Josie Merrithew: The Board reviewed a proposal by Josie Merrithew to conduct kayak floatboating activities on Lake Pend Oreille and Priest Lake. Following a review and discussion, MSC (Crane--Barker) THAT THIS ACTIVITY DOES NOT COME UNDER THE PURVUE OF THE OUTFITTERS AND GUIDES ACT. THEREFORE, SHE IS TO BE ADVISED SHE DOES NOT NEED AN OUTFITTER LICENSE.

Milt Butler/Doug Sayer: The Board discussed recent developments regarding a proposed sale of business between Milt Butler and Doug Sayer. This sale was approved by the Board at an earlier meeting. The Board directs that the Executive Director complete the issuance of the outfitter license at this time, advising Mr. Sayer that he is restricted from operating on Forest Service land until such time as he has secured a special use permit. (Addendum #6)

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Bar H Bar Ranch, Inc.: The Board reviewed a request from Bar H Bar, Inc., McGee Harris, DA, for the approval of an outfitter license to conduct limited deer and elk hunting, trailrides, wagon rides, and photography trips on his private property in the vicinity of Soda Springs. After review and discussion, MSC (Epley-Crane) THAT THIS APPLICATION BE APPROVED UPON COMPLETION OF THE NECESSARY PAPERWORK. (Addendum #7)



OPERATING AREA FOR HUNTING DEER, AND FOREST GROUSE,
AND FOR CONDUCTING CROSS COUNTRY SKIING AND PHOTOGRAPHY TRIPS

Outfitted activities will be conducted on privately owned land and grazing leases from both the Idaho Department of Lands and the BLM. This combined property is known as the Indian Springs Allotment, operated by Rudeen Ranches, in Power County, Idaho. (Caribou National Forest Map dated 1973, Map #21) (F&G Unit 73A)

CONDITION: Any private lands in the above area description are not covered by this outfitter license unless signed permission/lease is obtained and filed with the Board.

OPERATING AREA FOR ELK, DEER, SHEEP, BEAR, PREDATOR, FOREST GROUSE,
AND CHUKAR HUNTING AND FISHING, TRAILRIDES AND BACKPACKING

Beginning at the mouth of Robbins Creek on the Salmon River (Sec. 12, T24N, R3E, BM) on Idaho Department of Fish and Game Management (F&G Mgmt) Unit 14/19A boundary; then northerly up Robbins Creek to Seaburg Jeep Trail and continuing northerly to Florence; then north on Forest Roads 643 and 9925 to the SW corner of Sec. 30, T26N, R4E, BM; then due east to and across Gospel Hump Wilderness boundary to Marten Hill; then northeasterly to and along Trail 322 (and said wilderness boundary, in part) to its junction with Trail 313 (Sec. 14, T26N, R4E, BM); then easterly on Trail 313 to and along Gospel Hump Wilderness boundary to Anchor Meadows and F&G Mgmt Unit 14/19 boundary via Moores Guard Station to the head of Anchor Creek and F&G Mgmt Unit 14/19 boundary; * then southerly along the ranger district boundary common to Red River and Slate Creek Ranger Districts extending from Trail 313 down the hydrologic divide between the Sheep Creek and Wind River drainages to the Salmon River; then westerly downstream on the Salmon River to Robbins Creek and the point of beginning. [F&G Units 14 & 19] [NezPerce National Forest Map, 1981]

* **SPECIAL RESTRICTION:** The area identified between the Unit 14/19 F&G boundary east to the Red River/Slate Creek ranger district boundary and down the hydrologic divide between the Sheep Creek and Wind River drainages to the Salmon River is restricted to deer, elk, and incidental fall bear hunting **ONLY**.

ADDITIONAL OPERATING AREA FOR COUGAR HUNTING

Beginning at Florence, Idaho (Sec. 13, T25N, R3E, BM); thence north on Forest Roads 643 and 9925 to the SW corner of Sec. 30, T26N, R4E, BM; then due east to and across Gospel Hump Wilderness boundary to Martin Hill; then northeasterly to and along Trail 322 (and said wilderness boundary, in part) to its juncture with Trail 313 (Sec. 14, T26N, R4E, BM); then easterly on Trail 313 to and along Gospel Hump Wilderness boundary to Anchor Meadows and F&G Mgmt Unit 14/19 boundary via Moores Guard Station to the head of Anchor Creek and F&G Mgmt Unit 14/19 boundary; then southerly downstream on Anchor Creek on said F&G Mgmt Unit boundary to Wind River and continuing downstream on Wind River to the mouth of Circle Creek (Sec. 17, T25N, R5E, BM); then westerly on a straight line to Florence, Idaho, the point of beginning. **RESTRICTION:** Licensee is limited to a maximum of two (2) clients per season; that is, from the fall opening date through the winter to the closing in late winter or early spring. [F&G Unit 14] [NezPerce National Forest Map, 1981].

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ADDITIONAL OPERATING AREA FOR FISHING AND TRAILRIDES

Trailrides and fishing may also be conducted in the Slate Creek Ranger District of the NezPerce National Forest.

OPERATING AREA FOR CHUKAR HUNTING, FISHING, AND PHOTOGRAPHY TRIPS
